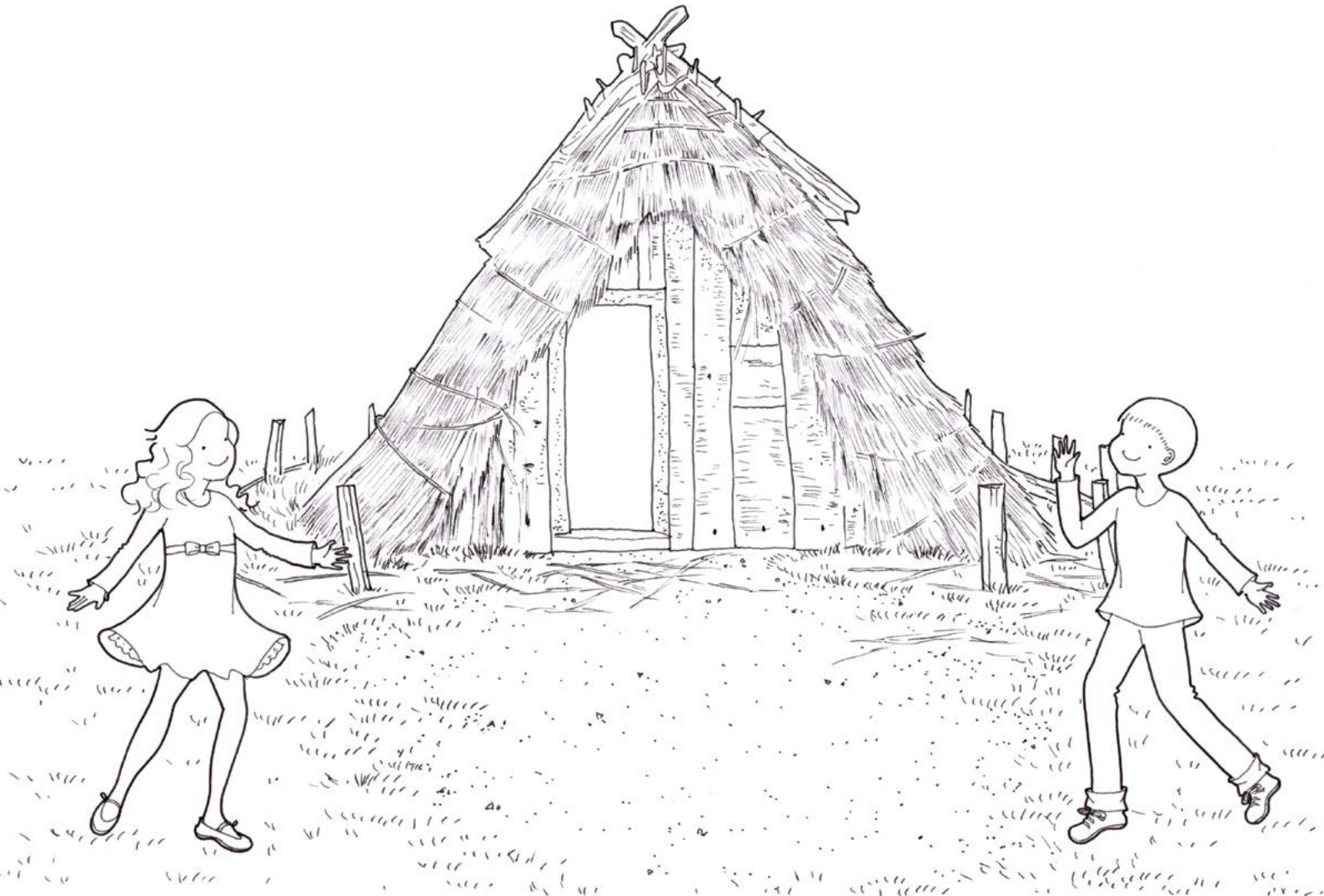


Introduction
