The Millpond Nature Trail is approximately 1.0 km along a footpath and boardwalk, which passes close to the water and crosses a wooden bridge.










Sea gates trap the water when the tides goes out.

In the Tide Mill, Sam and Hollie watched a video.










They learnt about how the Tide Mill works.

The millstones were contained in a wooden barrel called a 'tun'.










The 'tun' stops the flour spilling out.












Sam and Hollie learnt about the history of the tide mill.




