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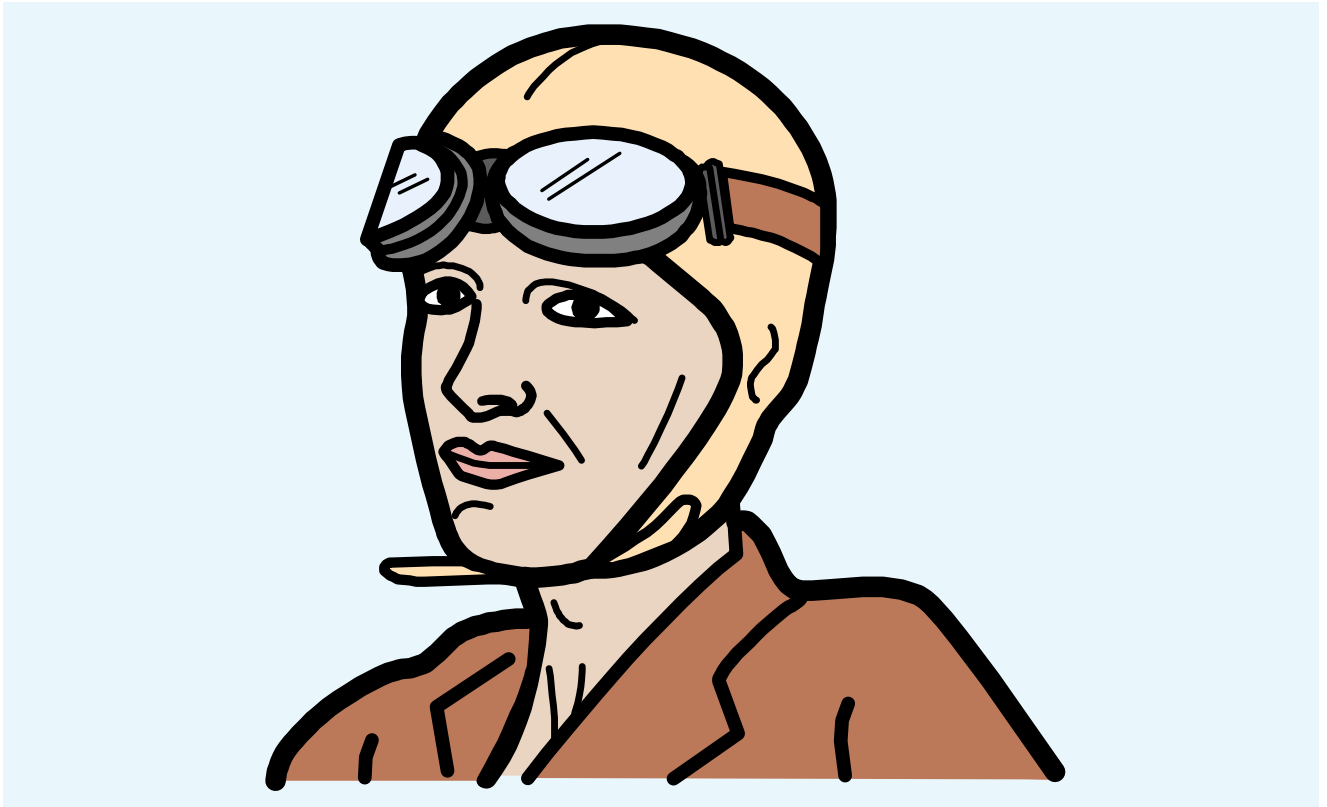
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

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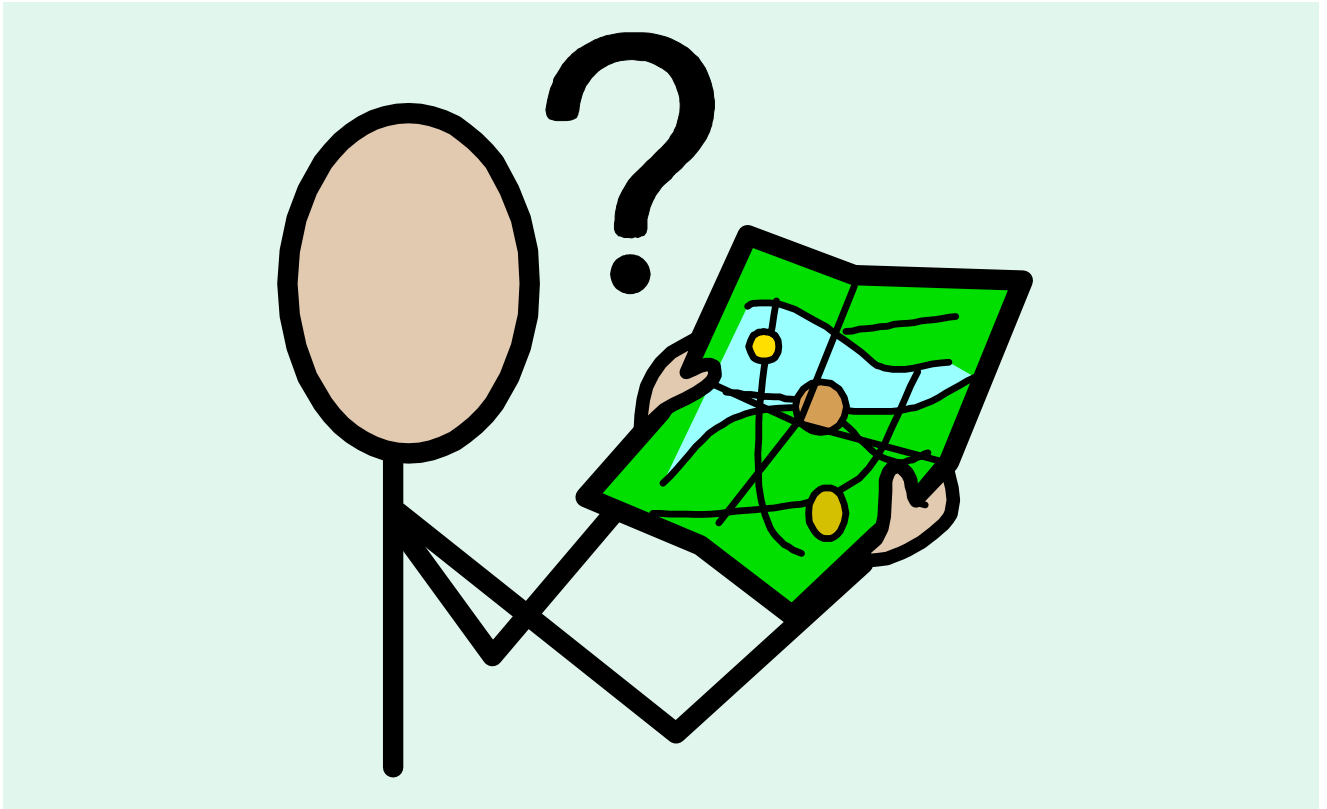



 Amelia Earhart was born in  KS in  July 1897.

She became the first person ever to complete this.

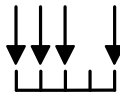
This achievement made Amelia very famous.

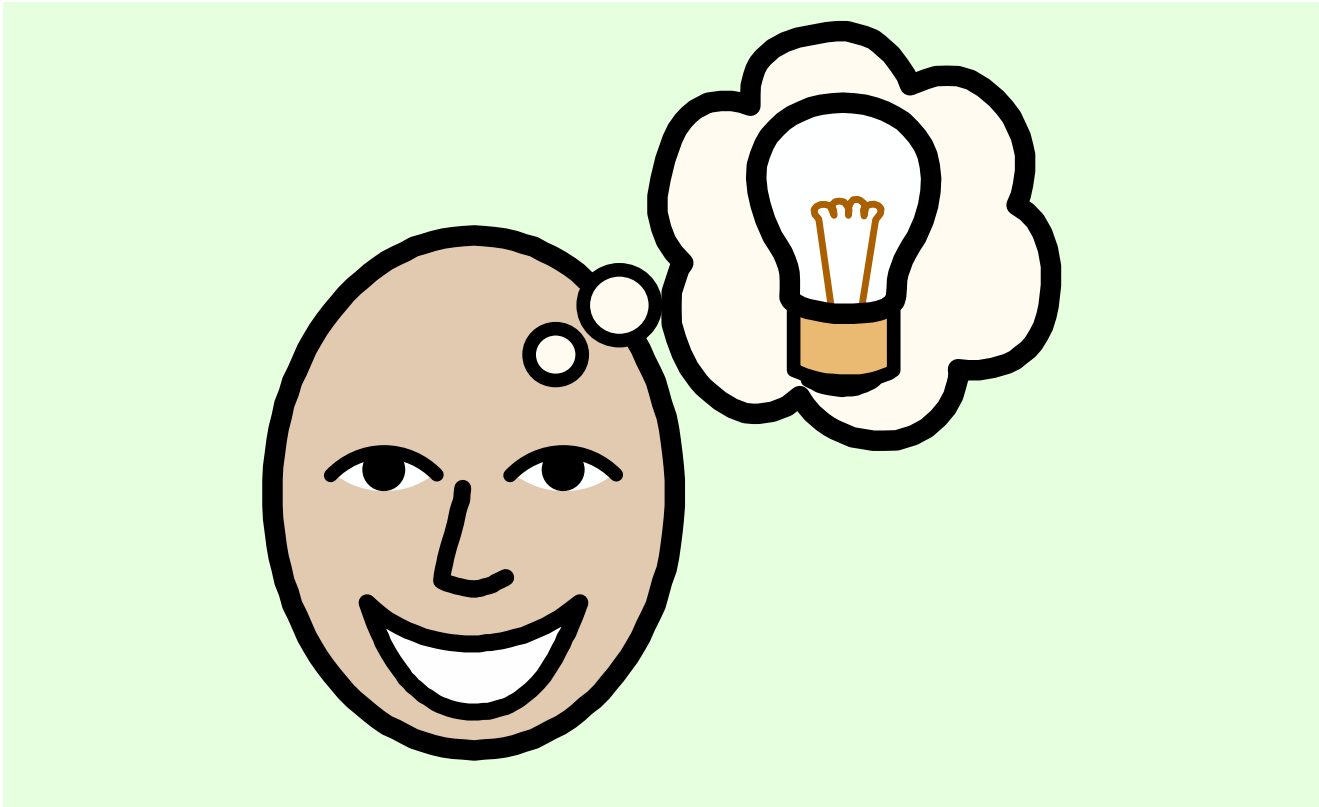


1937
