The Wailers played a type of music called reggae.

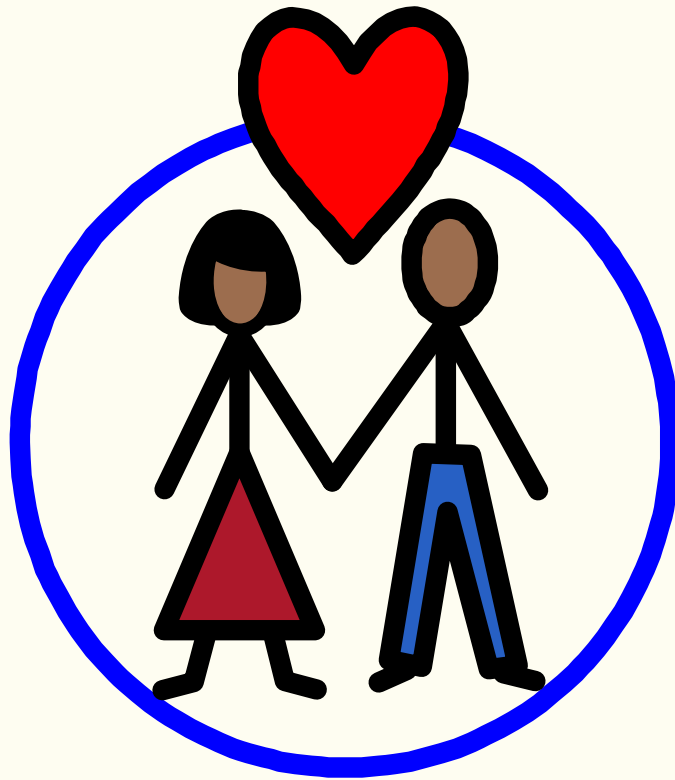


The Wailers recorded their first two songs in 1962.

'One Love' became famous around the world.

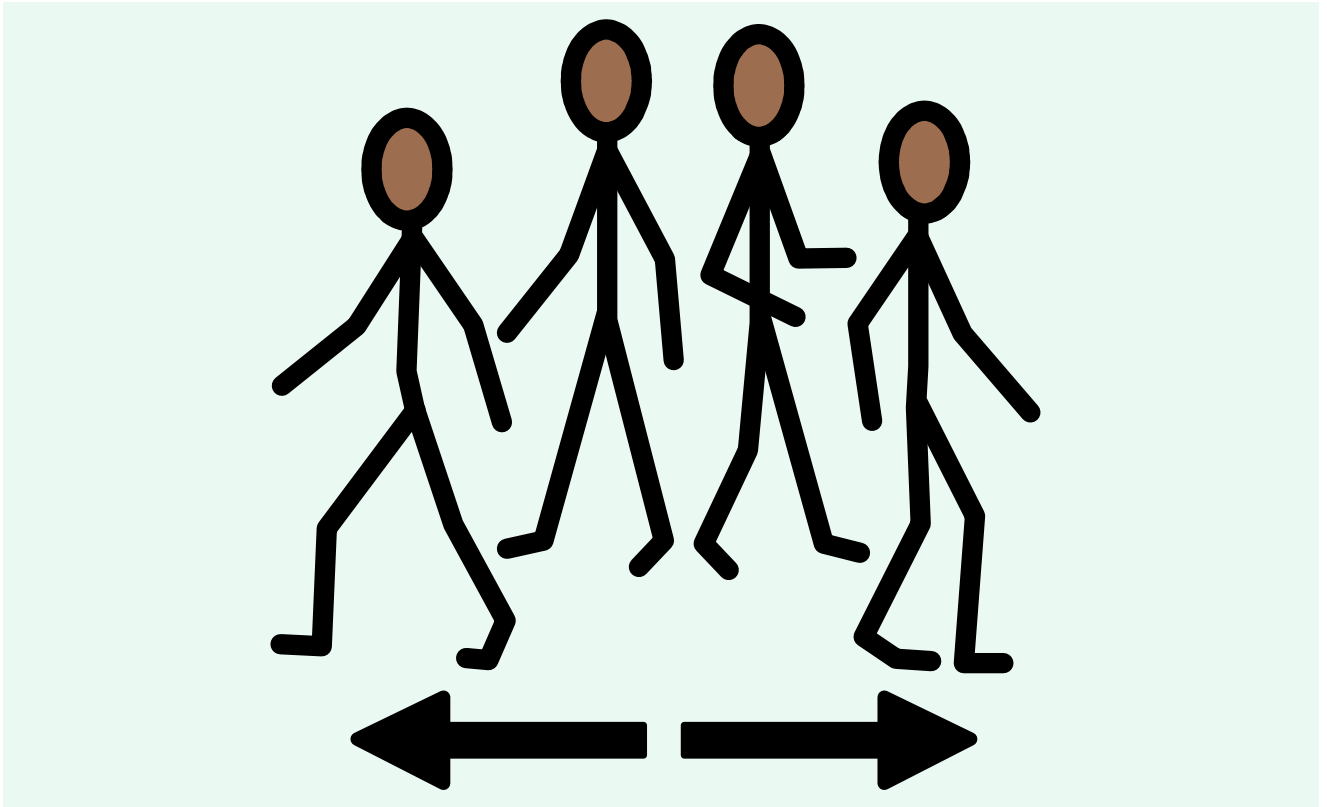


Bob married Rita Anderson in 1966.

Statues of Bob stand all over the world.

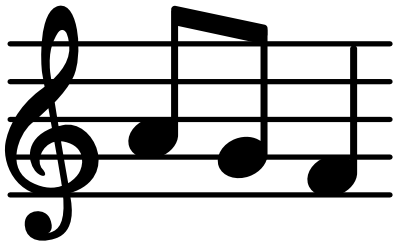
He is considered a folk hero in Jamaica.
