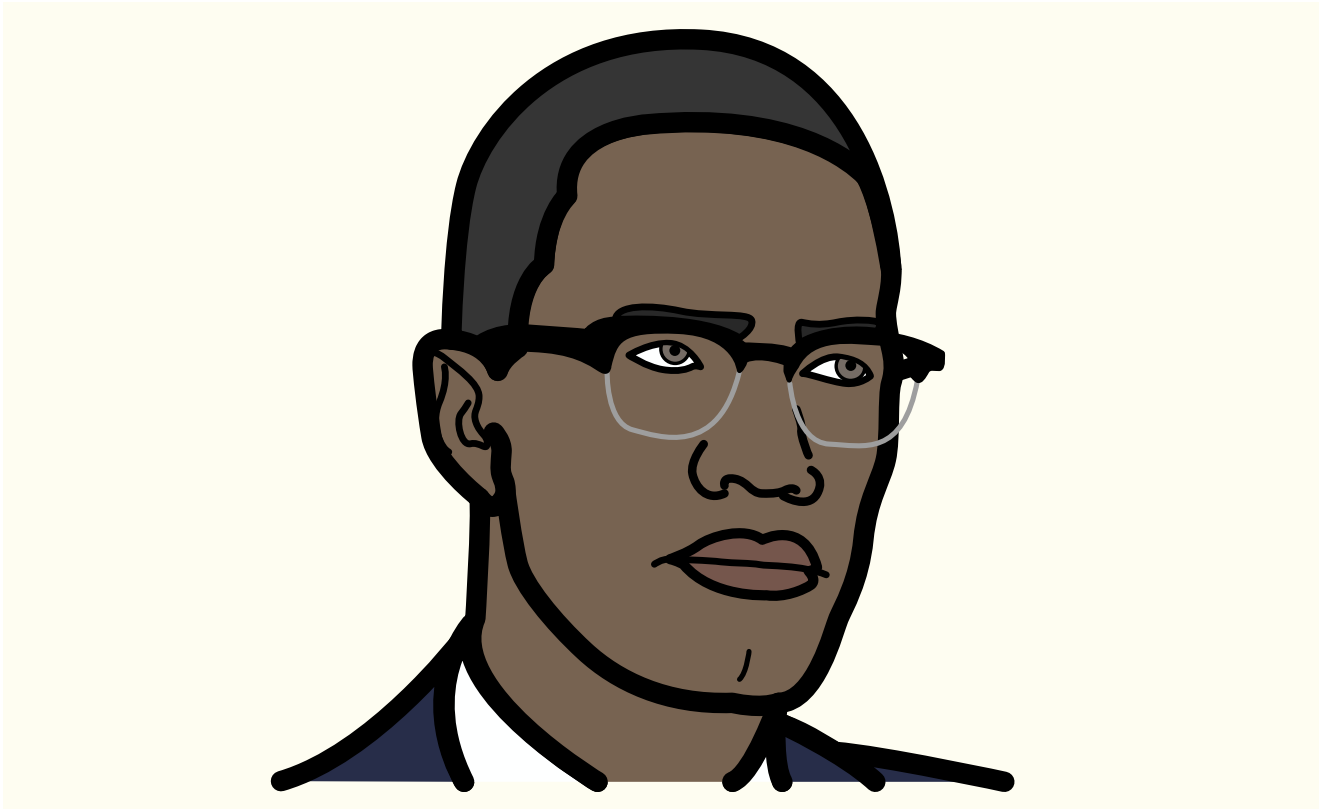

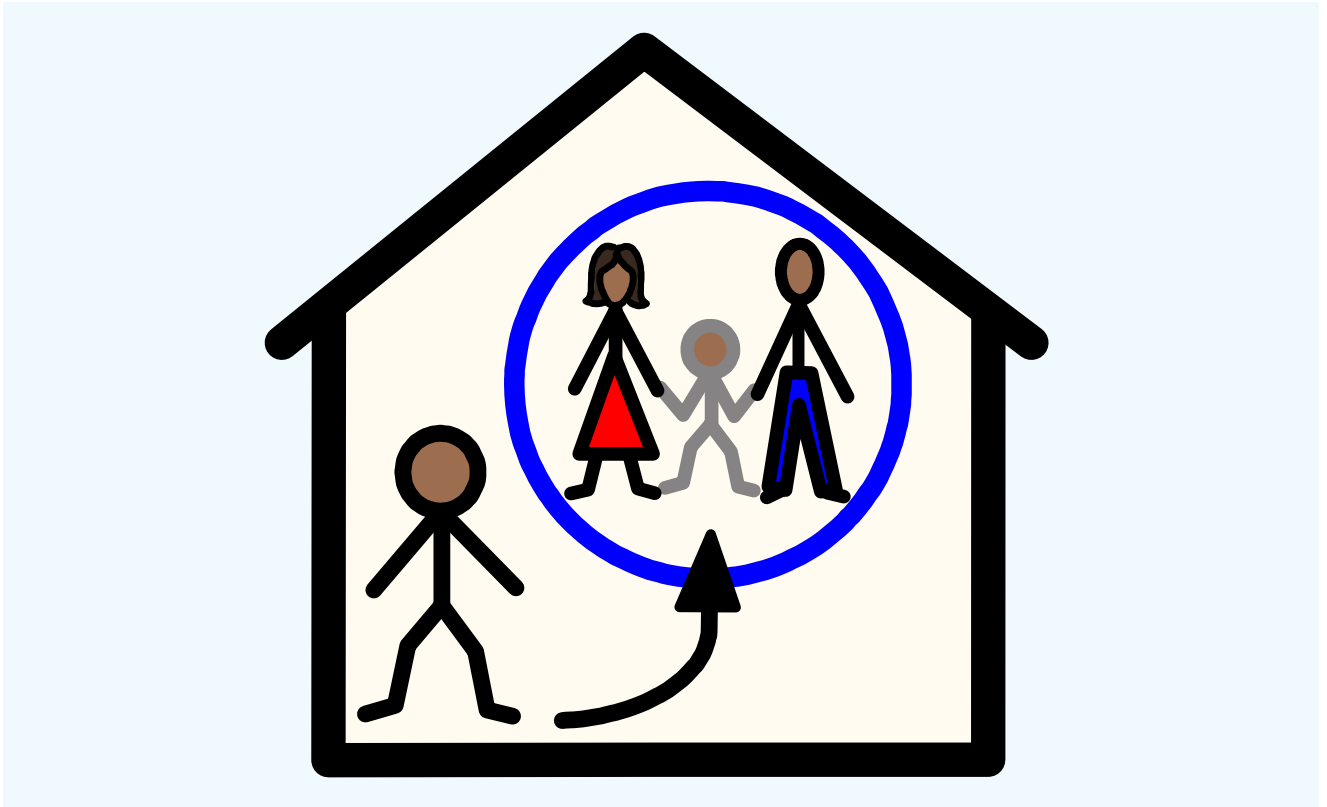


Malcolm X was born in 1925 in Nebraska, USA.

Malcolm grew up with relatives and in foster homes.

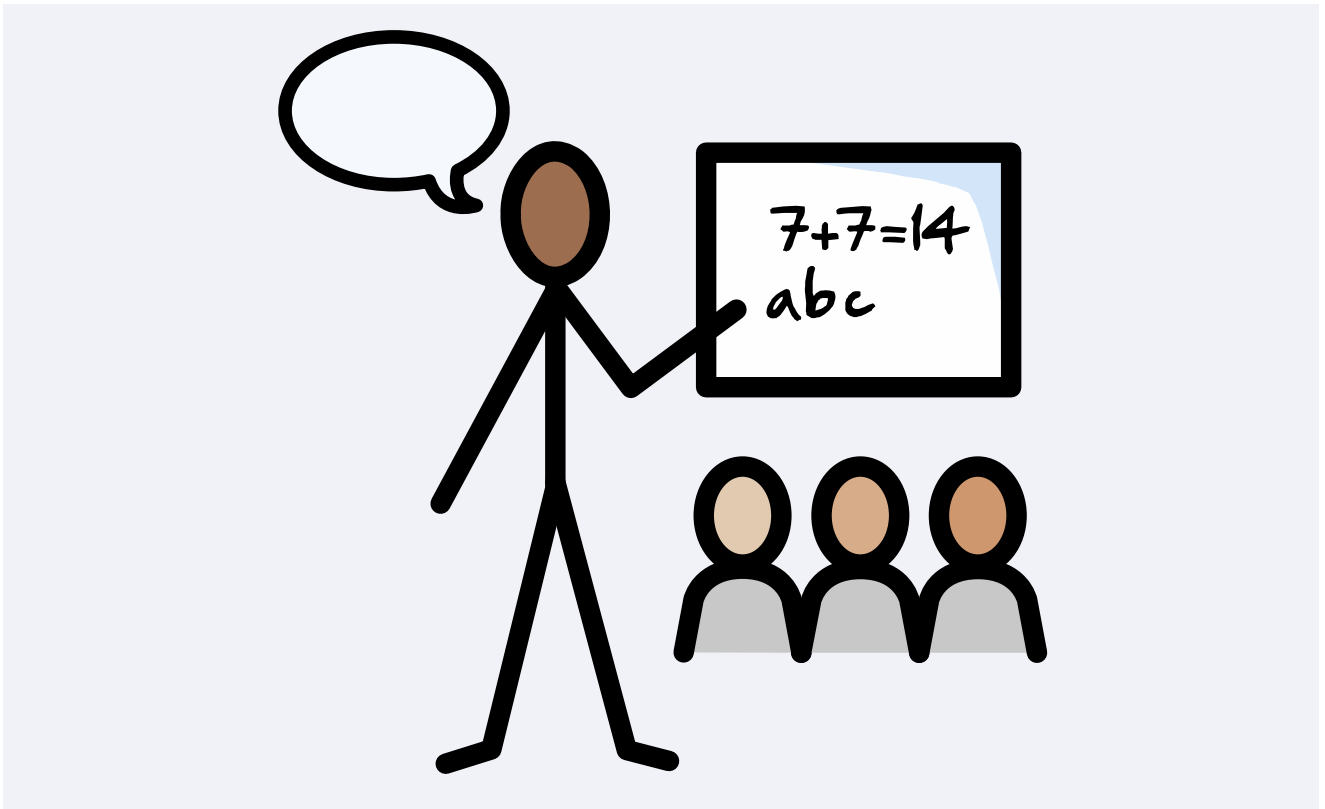


Malcolm became a criminal.

He became a Muslim and joined the Nation of Islam.

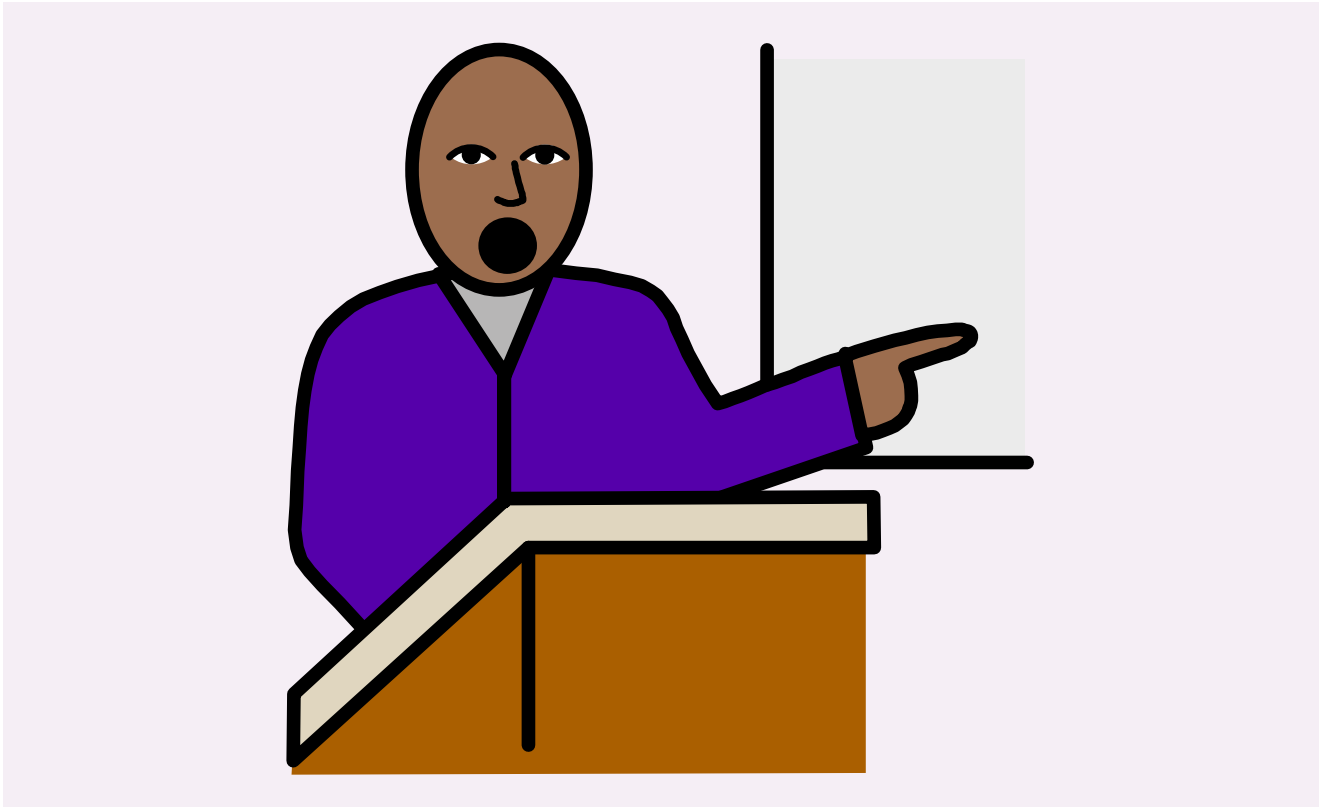


In 1950 Malcolm began using the name Malcolm X.

Malcolm became a leader of the Nation of Islam.

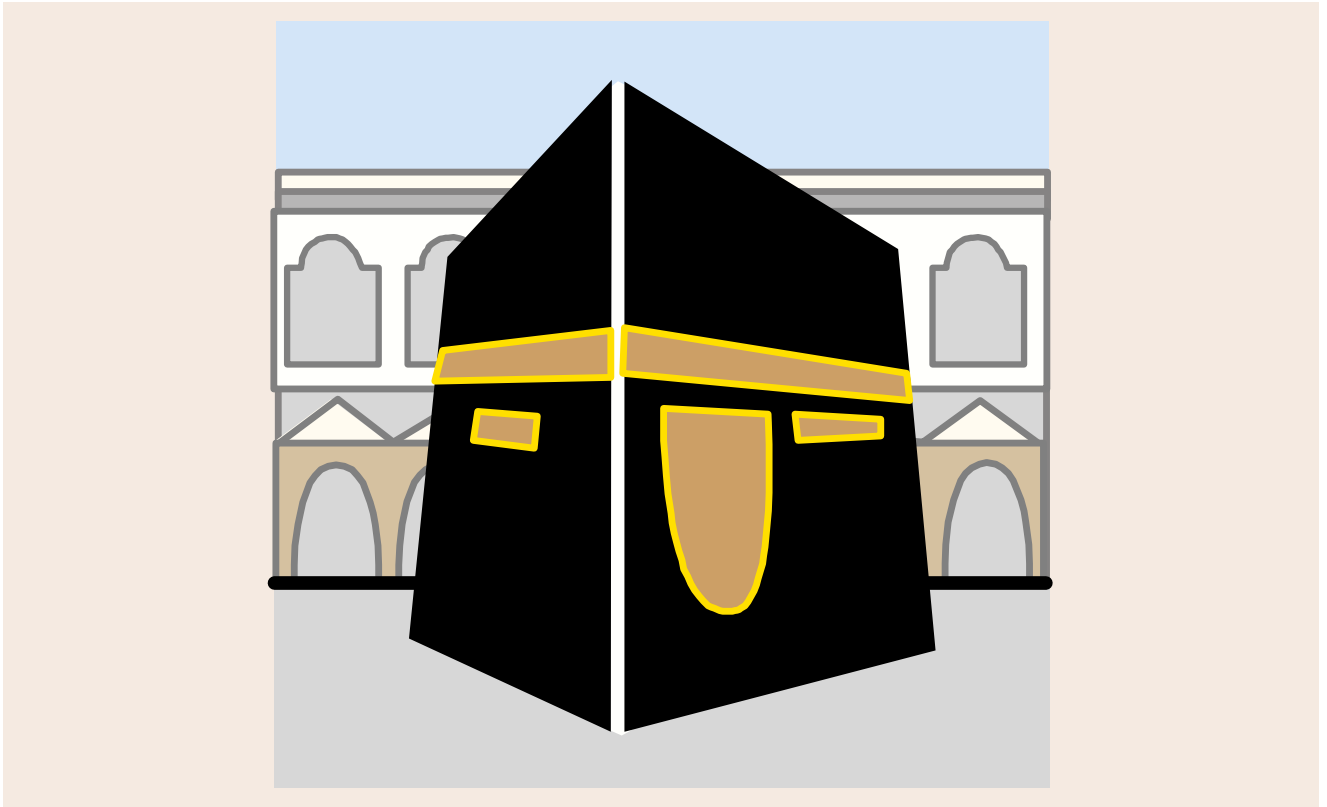


The Nation of Islam was a nationalist movement.

They didn't allow members to vote in elections.

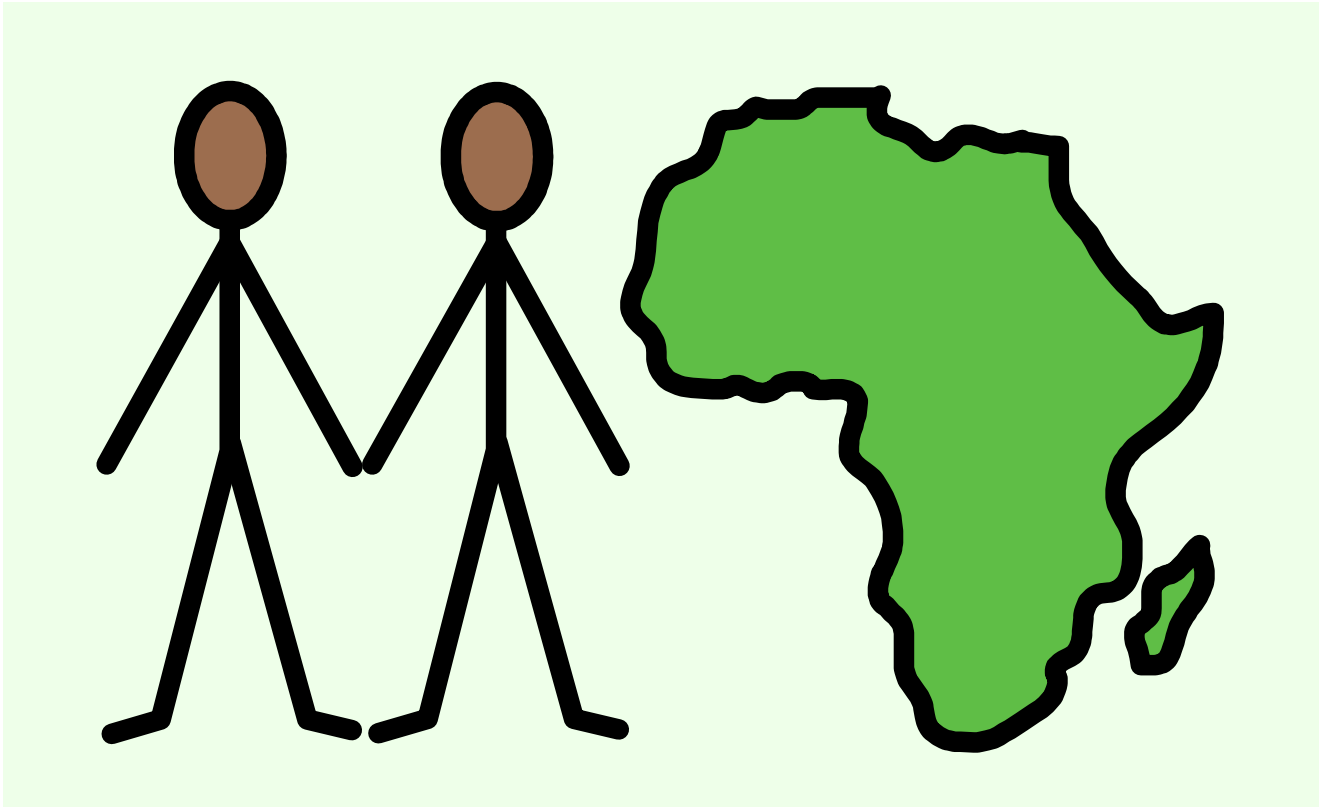


In 1964 Malcolm left the Nation of Islam.

Afterwards Malcolm became a Sunni Muslim.

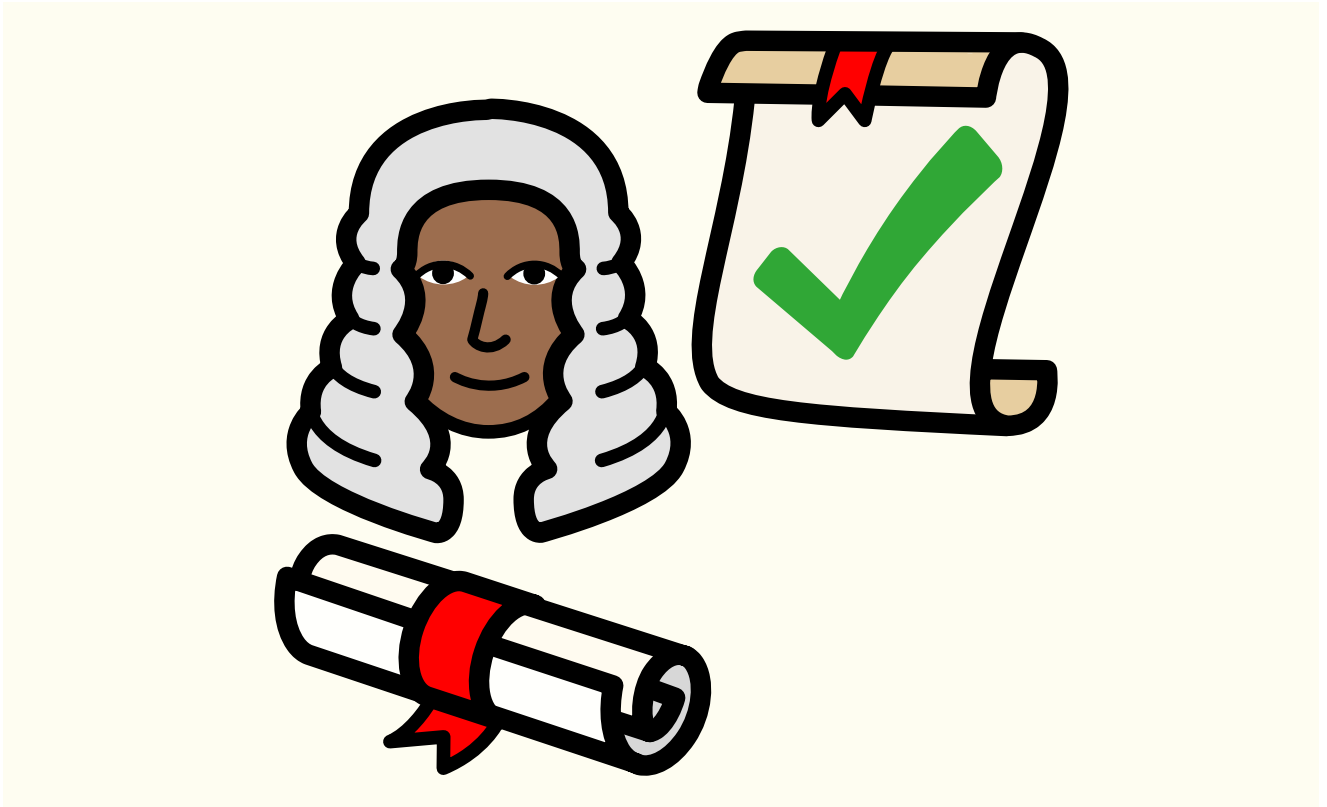


Malcolm came to believe in unity for all Africans.

Malcolm began to receive death threats.

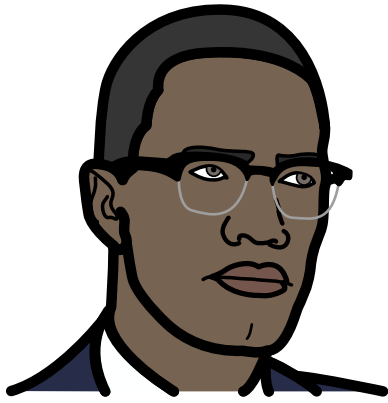


In 1965 Malcolm was shot and killed.

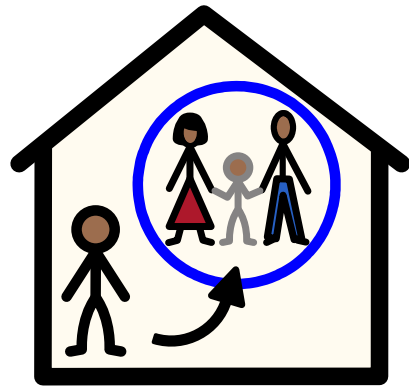
The gunmen were members of the Nation of Islam.

Thousands of mourners attended Malcolm's funeral.

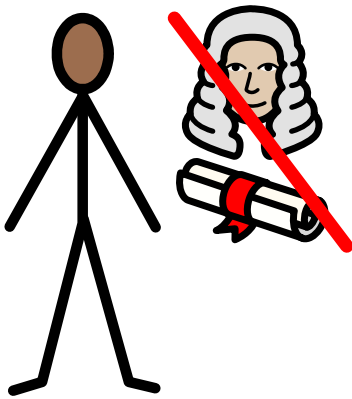
Afterwards he became an important political thinker.
