




Introduction

Autism and Nature is a non-profit organisation dedicated to enriching the lives of children on the autism spectrum, by helping to engage them with the countryside and nature. 'Alex and Rosie's Adventures in Hampshire' has been written to complement our guide 'Visiting the Hampshire countryside: a guide for parents/carers and teachers of children with autism'. The book tells the story of two children, Alex and Rosie, who visit many of the natural places described in our guide. Most of the places featured are in the South Downs National Park, but Alex and Rosie also visit places outside the National Park, including Yateley Country Park, Danebury Hill, Staunton Country Park and Royal Victoria Country Park. We hope that our story book will appeal to younger children with autism and children with speech and language difficulties, and encourage their interest in the South Downs and Hampshire countryside. The marbled white butterfly was Rosie's favourite.










Alex photographed a beautiful fritillary butterfly.














Alex and Rosie liked the boat in the playground.

The buttercup meadow was like a carpet of gold.







Alex and Rosie found a lot of orchids on the hill.












Rosie drew pictures of the orchids in her notebook.

Bees were buzzing and grasshoppers were singing.












Alex and Rosie picked dandelion seed clocks.

A scarecrow was sitting in the vegetable garden.




